"If you build it" they won't necessarily come reinvigorating student representative engagement in partnership with students



This project aims to make more of the potentially valuable role of student representatives through both enhancing their own personal and professional development and the integral role they play in mediating between the wider student body and the institution.

Aim: enhanced levels of student representative engagement with the opportunities that the University provides to incorporate authentic student voices in enhancing the student experience.

Objectives:

- increase level of student representative participation in existing processes/mechanisms;
- develop new mechanisms/processes in partnership with student representatives and the Hallam Union;
- empower student representatives to set agendas and actively research and pursue solutions.


Outputs and Activities:

- 2 large faculty student/staff fora;
- research with student representatives into effective/engaging mechanisms;
- trial at least two new mechanisms;
- training and development events/workshops for student representatives.
